



EXTRAORDINARY GENERAL MEETING - CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

Timeline on the Constitution relating to the Management Committee

When the Club was first formed in 1968, management committee members were elected by the members. In 1975, when the Johor State Government handed the Club House (the present dining hall and the swimming pool) to the Club in 1975, a new Constitution was drawn up to allow the Johor State Government to appoint all the committee members, save for 3 members to be elected. Three years later in 1978, the Constitution was further amended for all members to be appointed by the Johor State Government.

At the last Annual General Meeting in July 2008, amendments to the Club's Constitution were tabled. Among the amendments sought to be introduced was for the provision for 5 elected committee members into the Management Committee. The members of Royal Johor Country Club approved the amendments, subject to some revisions.

An Ad-hoc committee consisting of Mr. B.H. Khoo, YB. Dato Baharum Ghani, Mr. Jegathesan, Tuan Haji Ishak Sharif and Endk Jaafar Mohamed were appointed at the Annual General Meeting to study and revise the amendments. After several months of deliberation, the Ad-hoc Committee presented the revisions to the Management Committee who approved it to be tabled for adoption at an Extraordinary General Meeting to be convened.

An Extraordinary General Meeting was convened on 12th March 2009 for tabling of the amendments to the Club Constitution. The amendments providing, inter alia, for the election of 5 members into the Management Committee were unanimously accepted during the EGM.

The election of the 5 committee members was carried out immediately thereafter.
